A LIFELINE FOR THE WEARY

A nastasiya* and her friends
were out for a walk in the
neighborhood when suddenly the
air raid began. "We were not able to
hide. I was terrified," she said. Shrapnel
ricocheted around Anastasiya and
pierced her leg. A wife and mother
of five, her thoughts

immediately turned to her family: What would happen to them if she did not survive?

The war in Ukraine had destroyed the healthcare infrastructure in many communities, including Anastasiya's. She had to travel 16 hours to reach a medical facility that could operate on her leg—and even then, anesthesia and pain medication were not available to her during the excruciating procedure.

Anastasiya remained in a rehab center for several months, and her leg still did not heal. She only saw her husband twice during that time since he needed to be home with their children. Feeling alone and hopeless, she wondered if she would ever recover and enjoy a normal life with her family again.

Samaritan's Purse deployed an Emergency Field Hospital near Anastasiya's town in eastern Ukraine soon after the area was liberated. Our team performed a complex surgery on her leg that finally set her on a path toward healing. Samaritan's Purse staff also prayed with Anastasiya and shared with her about God's steadfast love.

Anastasiya is among more than **23,000 INDIVIDUALS** who

received medical care from Samaritan's Purse teams during the crisis in Ukraine. We thank God for nearly **700 STAFF** who deployed to that country to demonstrate Christ's love to people in desperate need and to help relieve suffering.

We deployed our first Emergency Field Hospital in Ukraine just one week after the conflict began. Our response soon expanded to include outpatient clinics, mobile medical teams, and ambulance transport services. Through 38 AIRLIFTS—36 of which were with our DC-8 cargo jet—Samaritan's Purse transported hundreds of tons of relief items, including medical supplies, for hospitals throughout Ukraine.

In addition to utilizing our aircraft to transport critical medical supplies, our DC-8 flew **267 UKRAINIAN REFUGEES** from Poland to Canada, where they reunited with family, friends, or sponsors arranged by Samaritan's Purse.

The conflict in Ukraine has resulted in more than 12 million people being displaced from their homes. As Ukrainians fled to western parts of the country, as well as to the neighboring countries of Moldova, Romania, and Poland, we began working with our network of more than 3,200 CHURCH PARTNERS to provide relief items.

Emergency food quickly became a significant priority. Samaritan's Purse distributed more than **120 MILLION POUNDS OF FOOD** through partners.

Oksana* shared with our team that she had no idea where her family

would find their next meal since grocery stores and businesses had closed. She is a single mother who fled to safety with her children after explosives ripped through their city.

"When your kids are scared, it's more difficult. When they ask you what is happening, it's hard to explain," she said.

After Oksana heard about a local congregation offering food assistance, she and her children made their way to our local church partner.

Our teams produced over 30 MILLION LITERS OF CLEAN

WATER and provided supplies such as solar lights, clothing, blankets, and hygiene kits. To keep families warm during the brutal winter, we also distributed coats, wood stoves, firewood, fuel, and generators.

In total, we served more than 11 MILLION PEOPLE. We also established an office in Ukraine to support long-term ministry. Most importantly, we are thankful for 370 MEN AND WOMEN who came to faith in Jesus Christ during this response.


"We are here to show the love of Jesus in a time that is so dark," said one of our nurses. "We step in for a minute to show them God's love and to be a safe space for them."



AGRICULTURE AND LIVELIHOODS

Our livelihood projects offer physical relief for struggling families while sowing seeds for the Gospel of Jesus Christ. People are empowered to earn a sustainable income as we teach farming and gardening, and provide agricultural training and livestock. In countries like Liberia, Kenya, and Iraq, we're teaching beekeeping as a way to help lift families out of poverty.

CATARACT PROGRAM

When people's eyes begin to cloud with cataracts, it is typically only a matter of time before they are blind. Although cataract surgery is a simple enough procedure in Western countries, it is nearly impossible to access in impoverished places such as South Sudan and Liberia. Samaritan's Purse sends medical teams to provide not only the gift of physical sight but also spiritual sight. In 2022, we performed 1,118 LIFE-TRANSFORMING CATARACT SURGERIES, all while sharing the love of Christ.

SERVING OUR NEIGHBORS

Vivian Mills realized that riding out Hurricane Ian in her home was not going to work, as swift-moving floodwaters crashed through the front door and began seeping through the walls. She swam through several feet of water in her backyard

to reach the two-story apartment next door. Vivian stayed with the neighbors until the water receded the next day.

She returned to find her house in shambles with no idea what to do or where to turn for help.

Samaritan's Purse quickly responded in Fort Myers, where Vivian lives, and two other hardhit areas of southwest Florida, after Hurricane Ian tore through the area as a Category 4 storm. More than 100 people were killed, thousands of homes were damaged or destroyed, and a powerful storm surge flooded structures several miles inland from the Gulf of Mexico.

Vivian was relieved when Samaritan's Purse volunteers arrived to help clean up her property. Our team removed waterlogged belongings, hauled debris to the curb, ripped out moldy walls, and tarped the roof.

Although she had given her life to Christ in the past, Vivian's faith was shaken. The volunteers demonstrated God's love and encouraged Vivian to continue trusting in her Savior.

"I'm a recovering drug addict. I'm not used to people being nice without wanting something," Vivian said. "But this is so different. Since the hurricane happened, it's been a wave of people coming in and loving on me and praying for me. It's been wonderful. I never knew there was this much love."

In the aftermath of devastating hurricanes, tornadoes, floods, ice storms, and wildfires, our volunteers continued to bring physical relief in Jesus' Name and spiritual comfort to hurting homeowners like Vivian.

In 2022, more than 15,300
VOLUNTEERS from across the country came alongside homeowners to help them move forward after natural disasters. Our teams logged 419,784 WORK HOURS, being the hands and feet of Jesus Christ to more than 6,000 FAMILIES during 18 DISASTER RELIEF RESPONSES IN 14 STATES. We praise God that 891 PEOPLE accepted Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior through this work.

When catastrophic rain swept through eastern Kentucky and triggered deadly flash floods, our volunteers mudded out houses and removed debris. Among those we served were Ronnie and Holly Banks, whose home had four feet of water in it.

"When we finally got back home, we couldn't even open the door," Ronnie said. "The floodwaters had thrown everything around the house. There was mud all through everything. It was a big mess."

The Banks family began cleaning up, but the work was overwhelming. They were so thankful for the team of Samaritan's Purse volunteers who worked hard clearing the home of mud and debris, setting up the family to begin rebuilding.

"How much they've done is amazing," Ronnie said. "It's going to help us keep our house. And we're learning about the calm after every storm and God showing us what He wants us to see in the storm."

Volunteer teams also sifted through the ashes and debris of hundreds of homes in Boulder County, Colorado, and northeastern New Mexico to find precious keepsakes after wildfires blazed through thousands of acres.

"The fire was the scariest day of my life. It was absolute horror," said Karen Roach, a homeowner in New Mexico. But Karen experienced hope through our volunteers. "Having these volunteers show up—I know it's going to be OK. We know that deep down."

Samaritan's Purse is also committed to caring for hurting families long after a storm has passed. In Mayfield, Kentucky, we launched a rebuild program following our response to a devastating tornado there in 2021 that left nearly 70 percent of residents homeless. Our rebuild effort includes a subdivision with 60 HALF-ACRE LOTS and a furniture assistance program to help up to 400 FAMILIES. As we rebuild homes, we also are installing storm shelters to provide protection during future storms.

This year we also continued rebuilding homes in Houma, Louisiana, after Hurricane Ida pummeled the southeastern part of the state in August 2021.

We are thankful to be able to serve our neighbors in need and to share the eternal hope of salvation in Jesus Christ.










POST-RESIDENTS

Our World Medical Mission Post-Residency Program has placed more than 230 CHRISTIAN PHYSICIANS AND DENTISTS at mission hospitals in 32 COUNTRIES since 2004. These medical professionals serve within their specialty alongside career missionaries where they seek to relieve physical suffering and to introduce patients to Jesus Christ, the Great Physician.








MISSION AVIATION

A fleet of **23 AIRCRAFT** give us the capacity to respond immediately to crisis situations around the world. This year, our DC-8 transported **1,476,154 POUNDS OF CARGO** and logged **812 FLIGHT HOURS**—the highest since we've had it in operation. Our float planes and CASA aircraft in Alaska recorded **1,275 HOURS**, and in remote areas of Africa, aviation allowed us to do ministry among many impoverished communities.

MENDING WAR'S DEEP WOUNDS

Army Sergeant Mike Morales carried the guilt of coming home from war when many of his comrades didn't make it back. This grief, coupled with injuries from multiple deployments to Iraq and Afghanistan, transformed Mike into a man whose regret and post-traumatic stress

threatened to ruin his life and his family.
He turned to alcohol to dull the pain.

"He was there and he wasn't there at the same time," said Mike's wife, Carolina. "I needed my husband, but I didn't have my husband for many years. I didn't know how to ask for help."

The couple applied to Operation Heal Our Patriots in desperation. They weren't sure what they needed to help fix the brokenness they felt, but they were ready to commit to doing whatever they could to restore their relationship.

The Moraleses didn't hold back

in Alaska. They poured themselves into the marriage classes and met with our retired military chaplains for guidance. The couple used wilderness excursions such as hiking and fishing to reconnect.

God replaced their guilt and shame with peace and hope. Mike and Carolina experienced the joy of His forgiveness. They wrote a list of their burdens and then burned it in the fire at Samaritan Lodge Alaska.

"I discovered in Alaska that I didn't need to carry that stuff

around anymore," Mike said.


Mike received Jesus as his Lord and Savior in Alaska. The couple also recommitted their marriage to God, and both Mike and Carolina were baptized in Lake Clark.

"I went into a deep hole for a long time, but now I want to be there for my wife and kids," Mike said. "I want to live a new life because I'm a new man."

Mike and Carolina are now among more than 1,500 couples who are part of the Operation Heal Our Patriots family. This year, 164 COUPLES PARTICIPATED, 96 PEOPLE MADE DECISIONS for Jesus Christ, 95 INDIVIDUALS WERE BAPTIZED, and 86 COUPLES RENEWED MARRIAGE VOWS.

Participants continue to grow through our Family Care ministry, which includes our Key Leader program that equips Operation Heal Our Patriots alumni to serve as mentors to other couples. We commissioned 10 KEY LEADER COUPLES in 2022.

Family Care also offers opportunities through Team
Patriot, a program in which veterans and spouses serve homeowners through our disaster relief efforts. Team



Patriot deployed **20 TIMES** this year.

We are thankful for the military families who continue to experience the healing power of Christ.

Operation Christmas Child

THANKING GOD FOR 200 MILLION BLESSINGS

In 2022, we celebrated the 200 millionth Operation LChristmas Child shoebox collected by Samaritan's Purse since 1993. We praise God for the millions of children, as well as families and communities, who've been reached with the Gospel of Jesus Christ over nearly three decades.



Former shoebox recipient Elizabeth Groff participated in a cross-country tour where she traveled to U.S. drop-off locations and processing centers with the symbolic 200 MILLIONTH SHOEBOX to encourage people to prayerfully pack boxes in Jesus' Name.

Elizabeth then took the gift to Ukraine, where she delivered it into the hands of Natalya, an 8-year-old living in an orphanage. Natalya said that her favorite gift in her shoebox was a yellow flashlight because it will help guide her as she seeks cover in a dark basement during overnight air raids.

Like Natalya, Elizabeth also spent most of her childhood in an orphanage in Ukraine. She was 7 when she and her younger sister ran away because her father died and her grieving mother turned to alcohol. Elizabeth's shoebox gift reminded her that God had not forgotten herand she prays that Natalya will also experience the Savior's faithfulness and love.

"I pray that this child realizes that she isn't alone," Elizabeth said. "I want her to know the hope of Jesus."

In 2022, **10.6 MILLION SHOEBOX GIFTS** were prayerfully packed for boys and girls all over the world by people from 11 countries. More than

4.4 MILLION SHOEBOX RECIPIENTS participated in our follow-up discipleship program, The Greatest Journey, with over 2.4 **MILLION BOYS AND GIRLS** making decisions for Christ.

Among the children who received gift-filled shoeboxes were the Himba of Namibia. These boys and girls belong to an unreached people group that worships their ancestors. God used Operation Christmas Child and The Greatest Journey to open doors for the Gospel and for churches to be started among the Himba.

In a fishing village in Benin, 12-year-old Alphonse received Jesus as his Lord and Savior after receiving a shoebox gift and attending The Greatest Journey. Brothers Conrad and KD, who live in the Pacific islands, both came to faith through Operation Christmas Child—and then led their father to faith in Christ!

More than 283,000 CHILDREN like Conrad and KD on over 960 PACIFIC ISLANDS have received shoebox gifts and have had an opportunity to respond to the Gospel.

Operation Christmas Child would not be possible without the 95,000 **VOLUNTEERS** who served at processing centers across the country to prepare shoeboxes for international shipment. We also thank God for the 16,816 VOLUNTEERS who served year-round globally with Operation Christmas Child.








International Emergency Relief

We airlifted more than 16 TONS OF EMERGENCY RELIEF SUPPLIES to Puerto Rico after Hurricane Fiona ripped through the southern and western parts of the island. Our teams distributed 2,220 SHELTER TARPS and 1,000 PORTABLE FAMILY WATER CONTAINERS, and also installed community water filtration systems.

Other international disaster responses included Tonga, where we provided **300 ROLLS OF HEAVY-DUTY SHELTER MATERIAL** after a volcano erupted, and Pakistan, where we worked with local partners to distribute food, hygiene kits, and water filters in the aftermath of widespread flooding.

The Greatest Journey

More than **4.4 MILLION SHOEBOX RECIPIENTS** participated in our follow-up discipleship program, The Greatest Journey, and **2.4 MILLION BOYS AND GIRLS** made decisions for Christ. Through these classes, children are learning more about God and how to share their faith with friends and family.





World Medical Mission

BRINGING THE HOPE OF ETERNAL LIFE

Lydia* was struggling to breathe when she arrived at Chogoria, a World Medical Mission partner hospital in Kenya. She had accidently ingested a poisonous insecticide. Dr. Paul Opare-Addo

was on call that night and summoned to the hospital. The family medicine physician had treated various health issues since coming to Chogoria through World Medical Mission's Post-Residency Program, but Lydia's situation presented a new challenge.

Not knowing how much poison Lydia had taken, or how serious her condition was, he contacted Poison Control in the United States for advice. He and his colleagues then intubated Lydia and gave her a central line to receive medication.

A ventilator kept Lydia breathing for several days, while medicine injected into her bloodstream helped her body combat the effects from the toxins. Hospital staff and chaplains prayed for her continually. Finally, she regained consciousness, only to begin a new battle against delirium.

Once Lydia stabilized, she spent time with the hospital chaplains who shared the Gospel with her. With a grateful heart, Lydia surrendered her life to Christ and accepted Him as her Lord and Savior. God used Dr. Opare-Addo and the team to provide Lydia with both physical and spiritual healing.

Lydia's recovery brought a renewed hope and joy to Dr. Opare-Addo and the staff after they had witnessed a number of deaths in the ICU.

"Stories like Lydia's are a reminder of the salvation story—we were all dead, and Christ came to restore us," he said. "Medicine is a great avenue to show humanity God's restorative power."

That's the goal of World Medical Mission as we support **DOZENS OF MISSION HOSPITALS** in developing nations. In 2022, we sent **640 HEALTHCARE VOLUNTEERS** on short-term trips to **44 HOSPITALS**. The Post-Residency Program welcomed **11 PHYSICIANS** who are among more than **230 MEDICAL PROFESSIONALS** who have prepared for long-term missionary service through that program since 2004.

In addition, our biomedical team made **20 TRIPS** to install and repair life-saving equipment at mission hospitals. We also shipped **52 CONTAINERS** of medical supplies to six hospitals in nine countries.

This year we launched our Hospital Evangelism Program. This Biblically based training program is further equipping chaplains as they introduce patients to Christ. We provided a curriculum that includes a workbook and a digital tablet filled with resources to help chaplains learn more about the Bible as well as skills such as trauma counseling.

"This is a great initiative that I believe is the first of its kind in mission hospitals," said Geoffrey Ndivo, lead chaplain at Kijabe Hospital in Kenya. "Thank you for helping our ministry."

Children's Heart Project

25 YEARS OF HEALING HEARTS

Buyanaa feared that her infant son, Ochir, would die from a heart defect that caused him shortness of breath, extreme fatigue, and a blue color of the lips and face. Even after

Ochir learned to walk, Buyanaa carried him most of the time to spare him the exhaustion that came from walking a few steps.

Frequent trips to their doctor in Mongolia resulted in Ochir being screened and accepted for our Children's Heart Project, which provides cardiac surgery for children in countries where this complex procedure isn't available. We are helping boys and girls from Mongolia, Uganda, Bolivia, and northern Iraq.

Ochir is among the **47 CHILDREN** in 2022 who received life-saving cardiac care through Children's Heart Project, which celebrated **25 YEARS** of mending hearts.

"We look forward to serving more and more children," said Samaritan's Purse President, Franklin Graham. "We pray for physical healing and, most importantly, we pray that God will use our efforts to heal hearts for eternity through the Gospel of Jesus Christ."Through Children's Heart Project, we transport the sick child along with a parent or guardian to North America or the Caribbean where they stay with a Christian host family and then undergo an operation donated by a local children's hospital.

Ochir now walks and runs with ease since his surgery.

"It's a relief to see my child healthy and running around," said Buyanaa of her now 2-year-old. "He isn't in pain—he's joyful and playful. I'm thankful to you all



and to God. He is an amazing God."

While in Grand Cayman for Ochir's surgery, Buyanaa committed her life to the Lord after hearing the Gospel during a Bible study led by our team. Upon Buyanaa and Ochir's return to Mongolia, the family began praying, reading God's Word, and attending church together. Buyanaa's parents and sister have since come to faith in Jesus Christ.

While Graham was in Mongolia to lead an evangelistic event, he met with children who have benefited from Children's Heart Project over the years and shared with them about how the project began by helping a child in war-torn Bosnia 25 years ago. Since then, we've assisted nearly **1,500 CHILDREN**, with over **400** of those from Mongolia.

"Life is precious. God has saved your life," he told them. "We give God the glory."

CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

Samaritan's Purse volunteers built a church and parsonage in the remote village of Scammon Bay, Alaska. The new buildings are kept stable by adjustable steel-frame foundations that adapt to the drastic freezethaw movement of the tundra. This was our **33RD CONSTRUCTION PROJECT IN ALASKA** since our first home rebuild efforts in 2006.









CLEAN WATER

Water, sanitation, and hygiene services in Yemen have severely deteriorated in the aftermath of a years-long civil war. Our clean water projects are offering convenient access to safe drinking water for thousands of Yemeni. Through our efforts around the world, we provided clean water to more than 315,000 PEOPLE, constructed or rehabilitated 1,200 WATER POINTS, and EDUCATED 347,000 PEOPLE on healthy hygiene practices.

Evangelism/Discipleship

SALVATION COMES THROUGH LIVING WATER

Sok* is a village chief in a remote area of Cambodia that lacked consistent access to clean water. A widower and father of six, he watched as families in his village suffered from waterborne illnesses. Children missed school, and their parents couldn't work because they were sick.

The impoverished village struggled to secure water for cooking, bathing, and washing clothes. Drought season also brought increased challenges to already vulnerable households, as livelihoods were threatened because farmers couldn't maintain their crops.

The first glimmer of hope for a brighter future came when a Samaritan's Purse team arrived in Sok's village. We drilled multiple boreholes and constructed a network of pipes to connect individual households to the new water distribution system. Sok and his community now have clean water not only to sustain daily household activities but to care for their livestock, crops, and home gardens.

Samaritan's Purse teams trained Sok and six others in the community on how to maintain the new boreholes so that they will stay clean and functional, providing safe water for years to come.

Our staff also shared the Gospel during these trainings, and by

the end, all seven individuals had received Jesus as their personal Lord and Savior. For the first time in their lives, they experienced the Living Water and a "fountain of water springing up into everlasting life" (John 4:14).

"I gave my life to Christ—I surrendered to Him. I live every day confessing Jesus as my Lord," Sok said. "He is going to take care of all my needs."

As we meet critical physical needs all over the world, our teams are intentionally seeking opportunities to share the eternal hope of Christ. Cambodia is one of many places where our evangelism and discipleship efforts are introducing people to Jesus and equipping local believers to share their faith.

Our teams connected Sok with a local pastor who met regularly with him and helped him to grow in his faith. Sok's deep desire for more people in his village to know God led him to start a Bible study and prayer group in his home.

"I am a follower of Jesus, and I evangelize other people," he said.

He is now using his musical talents to glorify God by leading worship during the weekly gathering. Sok is even teaching other people how to play different instruments so they can also help lead worship.

Sok is thankful to God for the Samaritan's Purse project that has improved his physical health and transformed his heart.

"I want my daily life to reflect Jesus Christ," he said. "As a good village chief, I demonstrate love and integrity in serving the villagers."




